		The course consists of the following compulsory modules:
		Methods and Theories of Global Christianity and Interreligious Relations, 15 credits International Issues within Global Christianity and Interreligious Relations, 15 credits
		The remaining elective modules, intended to ensure the depth and breadth of the doctoral student's learning, are to be determined with regard to the individual student's needs and the outcomes detailed under 3 above.
		Training in teaching and learning in higher education amounting to 3 credits can also be included among the elective modules.
