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The course consists of one compulsory module:
The Genealogy of Islamology: A Critical History of the Discipline, 7.5 credits
The remaining elective modules, intended to ensure the depth and breadth of the doctoral student's learning, are to be determined with regard to the individual student's needs and the outcomes detailed under 3 above. However, students are recommended to complete independent study courses of at least 7.5 credits of General History of Religions, 7.5 credits of the History of Islam and 7.5 credits of Specialised Methodology.
3 credits of training in teaching and learning in higher education may also be included among the elective modules.

The research student is expected to participate regularly and actively in the department's research seminars.
