## **Course content** Brief description of The aim of the course is to provide students with the the course and its knowledge and skills required to, on the one hand, write an internationally viable thesis on French literature in content including details of any sub-French and subsequently conduct independent research on divisions French literature, and, on the other, work as a tutor and supervisor in French at universities and upper secondary schools. The different modules of the course all use a number of important literary works and relevant works on methodology, literary history and criticism as points of departure. The course components are based on a problem-based approach in so far as the students are required to find the relevant primary and secondary sources for addressing different types of literary research questions. The course consists of three modules: 1. Basic literary and linguistic terminology and

history focusing on the novel and fictional prose, 25 credits
