A Note on Examination

The course consists of general information, library introductions, lectures by senior scholars, thesis presentations by junior scholars, seminars on the course literature, the PhD students' individual presentations of their research projects, and social events. Participants are expected to take an active part in all activities. After each lecture or presentation there will be time for questions and comments; after the thesis presentations by junior scholars there is a panel session. For the seminars, the students will be divided into eight groups of about 5 members each; at each seminar, two groups will present and debate the assigned text, so that each group will present at two seminars. All participants are expected to prepare for the seminars and be ready to discuss the subjects that come up. Finally, in the last week of the course the students will present their thesis projects, orally and in writing, and discuss them with each other. There is no additional examinations, but active participation in all events is required in order to pass the course.
