Knowledge and understanding	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>provide a specialised account of fundamental concepts of cognitive semiotics such as significance, meaning, cognition, sign, representation, image and language</i> • <i>provide a specialised account of fundamental issues of cognitive semiotics such as the relationship between different semiotic resources in time and space, and the relationship between body, mind and cultural phenomena</i> • <i>provide a specialised account of some of the theories and research methods of cognitive semiotics</i>
2.	Competence and skills	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>connect concepts of cognitive semiotics to theories of different traditions in an informed manner</i> • <i>apply several of the methods of cognitive semiotics to concrete empirical material in a critical and informed manner</i>

The modules represent three areas: 1) Modules that aim to provide students with specialised knowledge of relevant concepts, issues and theories of cognitive semiotics; 2) Modules that provide students with the ability to design and execute investigations of both a qualitative and a quantitative character of relevance to cognitive semiotics; and 3) Elective module(s) of relevance for the thesis project.</i>
