| 2. | General information | |
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| 1. | Type of course and its placement in the educational system | This is an optional course within third cycle studies in general linguistics, neurolinguistics, phonetics and English language and linguistics, and the course can be taken as part of other third cycle studies in linguistics. |
| 2. | Language of instruction | The language of instruction is generally English, but the course can also be offered in Swedish upon special agreement between the lecturer and students. A precondition for this type of agreement is that the lecturer and all the students are proficient in Swedish. |

| 4. | Course content | |
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| 1. | Brief description of the course and its content, including details of any sub- divisions in the course. | The course provides a brief overview of phonological theory and delves into a few current phonological theories. The course furthermore addresses how the current theories can explain phonological processes and how the different explanatory models differ. The course also places a great deal of emphasis on how the theoretical specialisations have historically emerged in relation to other theoretical specialisations in the field and how contemporary trends in the field relate to each other. During the course, students will conduct a study of an empirical phenomenon based on a selected theory in one or more languages. |

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| 1. | Teaching methods employed, including details of any compulsory components | Teaching in the course consists of lectures and seminars. Eighty per cent (80%) participation in lectures and seminars is required to pass the course. Group work and peer review may be conducted. | |
