1.	Brief description of the course and its content including	<i>The course includes modules that are to be selected in consultation with the supervisor. The modules represent three areas: 1) specialised theoretical and empirical</i>

	details of any sub-divisions	<i>studies of the structure, variation and development of Greek; 2) specialised knowledge of Greek literature; 3) specialised insight into the development and orientations of classical philology. Furthermore, the course includes elective modules of relevance for the research studies of the individual student.</i>
